Tisha B'Av is the major day of communal mourning. First and foremost Tisha B'Av commemorates the destruction of both the first and second temples in Jerusalem (586 B.C.E, and 70 C.E respectively) This Month Begins evening July 25th ends evening of July 26 2015

The High Holidays

September 14 - September 23, 2015

January 25, 2016

New Year for the Trees -- how to celebrate our connection to the environment and appreciate the fruits of the Land of Israel.

Purim

March 24-25, 2016
